EDITORIAL

Since it started to fund summer research students doing age-related research in 1999, the Foundation has funded 23 such students. Since it began funding scholarships for masters and doctoral student in 2004, 31 scholarships have been awarded to 18 doctoral students (some students have been supported for more than one year), and eight to masters students. In addition we have arranged at least one public seminar most years, paid for some contract research on issues the Foundation felt needed urgent review, and funded a visiting professor.

For the whole of its existence, the Foundation has depended for funding on the generosity of several hundred Friends of the Foundation donating regularly, events organised by the Friends Committee (current Chair, Mrs Carolyn Ward) and support from a range of philanthropic organisations. The latter include the Freemasons Roskill Foundation, the Picot Family Charitable Trust, the Ted and Mollie Carr Foundation, the Sunset Foundation, the Goodfellow Trust, The JR Lewis Trust, the Ruby Nolan Trust, the James Wallace Arts Trust, the Anonymous Trust and the Selwyn Foundation.

We can now announce that the Selwyn Foundation has agreed to become a 'cornerstone' partner as from this year, assisting with over 80% of our budget. The Selwyn Foundation is one of the leading providers of aged care in New Zealand, an organisation with a reputation for probity and good management with whom we feel privileged to be associated. For the first time in its history, the HOPE Foundation can reasonably expect a secure future. We will still need to raise some funds because we want to ensure that HOPE retains an independent identity. I believe that you, as a faithful supporter will be as encouraged by this development as we are.

We owe special thanks to the Selwyn Board and its CEO Garry Smith for their positive response to our approach, and to our own Board member and acting Executive Officer, Rod Perkins for his key role in the negotiations.

SUMMER RESEARCH STUDENTSHIPS AWARDED

There were four applications for two studentships in the Faculty of Medicine for the 2012 / 2013 summer holidays. Awards were made to Robert Carr BA and Mr. Stephen Zhuo Chen Vie a second year MBChB student.

Robert's ambition is to determine if environmental factors such as temperature and humidity are associated with hospitalisation of older frail people. Measurements of temp., humidity etc. taken previously will be merged with NIWA climate data for the local area. It will then be possible to determine if there is a significant difference between household and ambient temp. / humidity. His supervisor is Prof. Ngaire Kerse working in the department of General Practice and Primary Health.

Stephen aims to quantify and describe the epidemiology of diverticular disease (DD) of the bowel to determine what is needed to help to fill knowledge gaps or pose future research questions. Issues such as hospitalisation rates, mortality, costs, gender and age, readmission rates and the use of procedures will all be examined. DD has a significant impact in the ranks of the elderly but there is little information about its epidemiology in NZ. Steven's supervisor will be Ms. Joanne Broad, MSc. Dept. of Geriatric Medicine.

The Foundation is hoping to mount a seminar at which these students can present their results to interested parties.

RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED

There were nine applications for scholarships for the 2013 academic year: two from Auckland, four from Massey and three from Otago. Four scholarships, each of \$6000 were awarded. At The University of Auckland, PhD students Ankita Umapathy and Rashika Karunsinghe received awards. Both were HOPE scholars in 2012.



The Board's policy is that scholarships at doctoral level are renewable for up to three years, the normal length of the doctoral course, providing good progress has been made. Ankita's research on the prevention of eye disease in older people.

At Massey University, the scholarship was awarded to Louise Elisabeth Cooper who is working in a doctorate in Clinical Psychology programme supervised by A/ Prof Paul Merrick.

Working on the thesis that was first enunciated many years ago by the famous endocrinologist Hans Selye that altruism is protective against stress in life, she is investigating the relationship between volunteering and depression in older people.

Depression is common in older age. Many people feel that they have nothing more to contribute.

The actual title of her research is: *Doing good and feeling well: the relationship between volunteering and protection against depression older adults..*



The award at The University of Otago went to Tara Martin, an MSc candidate from the Division of Health Sciences, Wellington.

Her research, supervised by Prof. Mark Weatherall involves testing the ability of rhythmical (metronomic) sounds to reduce gait 'freezing' and falls in people with severe Parkinson's disease when they are attempting to walk.

Short term studies have shown an improvement in gait with such devices but there are no long term studies and little data on falls.

Tara's subjects will be given six month's supervised tuition in the use of the small electronic metronomes in the hope that any benefits will persist over the long haul.
